He stepped up Joey's job coach, Dietrich. Dietrich knew a thing or two about fear. Dietrich had been deployed to Afghanistan and knew that Joey had to start small and that fear would not win. One foot in front of the other. Dietrich knew that in order for Joey to conquer his fear, he needed confidence. Dietrich gave Joey small tasks—first, you clean the mirror. And Joey did—it was shiny and bright. Other tasks followed.

One thing stood in his way. Joey was really afraid of cleaning a toilet. The task ahead really unsettled him. Dave's Corner

Greetings STARS supporters,

The first two months of 2017 offer a preview to a challenging year for STARS and other AZ providers for people with developmental disabilities, as the new minimum wage and earned sick pay provisions place additional pressures on an industry already burdened with reimbursement rates lower than those of 2009.

For the 18 months beginning January 1, industry providers estimate the impact of the costs attributed solely to Proposition 206 to be \$72 million.

To provide temporary relief, the Governor's Office provided \$25 million in emergency funds for the remainder of the current fiscal year. That, however, leaves a gap that, hope rests with the Legislature to craft a budget that funds provider services at appropriate reimbursement rates.

Thoughtful ways one can help: Advocate! Contact your State Legislators to express your concerns. Pray! Offer prayers that our lawmakers receive guidance and wisdom.

Take advantage of the opportunity to donate to the tax credit cap - you have until April 15th this year.
